D. Urban Native Center OJJDP grant application Erin Binneboese
Office on Juvenile Justice Delinquent Prevention Strategies to Support
Children Exposed to Violence Supporting Urban Natives (SUNs)

Office on Juvenile Justice Delinquent Prevention funding is used to improve strategies to support children exposed to violence. We've named our grant proposal Supporting Urban Natives (SUNs). SHIP will be the applicant for this grant and Urban Native Center will be the subrecipient along with Consulting by Design. We intend to utilize SHIP staff members for grant accounting and administrative oversight while Urban Native Center will host a full-time licensed independent social worker (LISW) and Outreach Coordinator. Consulting by Design will facilitate reporting and evaluation needs. The Community Initiative for Native Children and Families (CINCF)

will serve as our oversight committee, guiding the direction of the work. The award ceiling is \$900,000 over 3 years and the grant application is due June 7, 2022.

E. CJJP COP grant application Criminal Juvenile Justice Planning Pre-charge Diversion

Criminal Juvenile Justice Planning (CJJP) is offering the opportunity to apply for a Precharge Diversion grant. This funding would be used to partner with the Sioux City Police Department, specifically with their School Resource Officers. They wish to revise current procedures for handling offenses that happen in the school setting. The grant ceiling is \$150,000 over 3 years. The grant application is due May 27, 2022.

Two Board members were not in favor of applying for this grant without more buy-in, feedback and guidance from the Sioux City Police Department and the Sioux City Community School District.

Sky Ranch Behavioral Services Youth Reentry Grant Application

SHIP is applying for an Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency (OJJDP) grant on behalf of Sky Ranch Behavioral Services (SRBS).

Grant duration: 36 months, beginning 10/1/22 and ending 9/30/25

Population served: Youth of all genders, ages 12-17 in the 60 mile radius of Woodbury County, priority for females and youth of color: Native Americans, African Americans and multi-racial youth

served: 168

Funding: \$750,000; SHIP indirect cost: 10% of total budget

Program partners: Juvenile Court Services & Woodbury County Juvenile Detention Center

Program purpose: SRBS will deliver evidence-based pre-release services to youth in placement and will continue seamlessly to post-release services through collaborative long-term, open-ended services customized to each youth. Specialists (Case Managers) will be trained effectively to deliver intensive case managements built upon the Cognitive Behavioral Theory model for effective youth reentry. Individualized interventions to promote well-being in mental health, reduced substance use, and vocational success will include Adolescent Community Reinforcement Approach* and Aggression Replacement Training**. Mentoring will be provided by the Mentors in Violence Prevention Strategies*** peer model guided by the University of Northern Iowa Center for Violence Prevention. Expected program outcomes will result in increased protective factors, strengths and coping mechanisms; reduced risk, recidivism and criminogenic needs, improved mental health/ well-being: reduced substance abuse and reduced risk-taking and violent behavior.

Northwest Early Childhood Iowa Fiscal Agent Services
Northwest Early Childhood Iowa (NECI) is the designated Early Childhood Iowa
Board for Cherokee, Lyon, Plymouth and Sioux Counties. SHIP has a history of

^{*}Adolescent Community Reinforcement Approach (ACC/ACRA) Training, Certification, Coaching, and Technical Assistance - Protocol for working with adolescents who have serious substance abuse problems after they are discharged from a treatment program.

^{**}Aggression Replacement Training (ART) Training - Approach to provide cognitive, affective, and behavioral interventions to build competence in social skills, anger control, and moral reasoning.

^{***}Mentors in Violence Prevention (MVP) Training - Model to address the prevention of a broad spectrum of coercive and violent behaviors such as stalking, intimate partner abuse, sexual harassment, sex assault, and all forms of bulling and aggression.

working with this Board, most recently Kerri and Matt contracted services to help transition between their Executive Directors, and to move the Board out of a conditional designation with the state. SHIP currently serves as the Employer of Record for this Board, with SHIP employee Dawn Sickelka serving as the Director since August 2021. NECI has been utilizing Upper Des Moines Area Opportunity as their Fiscal Agent and desires to switch over to SHIP as of 7/1/22.

FUNDING: NECI's Fiscal Year 2022 funding was \$777,889. SHIP will charge a 10% Fiscal Agent fee for these services.

3. Discussion Items

A. Director's Report

Matt Ohman

SHIP Employee Benefits Meeting

On April 5th, we held our annual benefits meeting for all SHIP employees. This year we switched our health benefits broker from Mills Shellhammer Puetz to Gallagher and added even more choice for employees by offering a high deductible health plan and an HSA. Employees can now select one of three health plans to better meet their needs. Our new plans began May 1st.

BOOST Department of Labor grants

I spent much of late March and early April working on two federal DOL grants for the BOOST program: Pathway Home 3 and Growth Opportunities. Both grants were approved by the SHIP Board at the March 18th meeting. Kelsey worked on the financial/budget portions of the grants while I worked on connecting with and getting letters of commitment and Memorandums of Understanding from multiple community partners. Our grant writers at Consulting by Design submitted the Pathway grant on April 14th and the Growth Opportunities grant on April 21st. We anticipate hearing about funding status in the next month. If neither grant is awarded, the current BOOST program will end June 30th.

Chiropractic First of Iowa

We were visited by employees of Chiropractic First of Iowa (located on Gordon Drive) on April 26th. They do a quarterly fundraiser for nonprofits at their office, and for the first quarter of 2022, they chose SHIP! We received a check from them and

will be partnering with them in the future – Dr. Davis will do some team-building over lunch with us later in the summer. Beyond the Bell Strategic Planning I continue to work closely with Beyond the Bell, as we will be working on further wage increases to attract and retain quality staff, and an upcoming fee implementation in South Sioux, as well as a potential fee increase in Sioux City. We met as a team on March 28th and April 27th to talk about these items, as well as a restructuring of the current administrative staff's roles and responsibilities.

SHIP new office

I have executed a 5-year lease for the new SHIP administrative office location at 2540 Glenn Avenue. The new location will house seven staff. Our lease begins June 1st, but we are doing extensive renovations that may delay our move-in date a bit.

Finance Updates:

• After completing the detailed reconciliation and compiling extensive supporting documentation, SHIP's 2nd PPP (Paycheck Protection Program) loan has been forgiven by the Small Business Administration. Our loan totaled \$297,590.

- SHIP successfully filed the June 30, 2021, Form 990. Copies are available upon request. We are also working to file the 990 of our fiscal agent contracts.
- SHIP facilitated our open enrollment period in May for benefits available our full-time employees. We diversified our offerings for employees this year and added a high-deductible plan with a corresponding health savings account.

- DHS Stabilization Grants The State of Iowa opened a second-round opportunity to apply for DHS Stabilization grants. Here is the breakdown of those awards:

- United Way Jump Start Beyond the Bell received \$25,041 from United Way of Siouxland to serve 24 preschool aged children during summer programming. These funds support the necessary staff and other summer enrichment activities.
- 21st Century Community Learning Center Grant Beyond the Bell received notification of a successful award of another 21st Century Department of Education grant. This 5-year award of \$938,350 is projected to serve 240 kids at Loess Hills and West Middle School.
- Nebraska ESSER South Sioux City Beyond the Bell has received \$155,000 over the next two fiscal years to support summer and school-year programming at the five elementary schools.
